MRF Year End Update Via Claude Revely

As we close out 2023, here is a snapshot of where we are at year's-end, and where our focus will be in 2024.

Autonomous Vehicles (AV) – Over the summer, MRF Leadership met with officials at the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to discuss our concerns about the deployment of AVs and their interactions with motorcycles. This fall, NHTSA issued a recall of Tesla vehicles following the investigations, including one focused on fatal crashes involving motorcyclists. All companies operating in the AV space should be accountable for what they deploy on our roads. The growth of AV technology, along with the prevalence of distracted driving, remains a major concern for us. We were grateful that our champions on Capitol Hill used congressional hearings to elevate this topic and we remain engaged on this critical issue in 2024.

Bikers Inside the Beltway (BITB) – The 2023 BITB had the largest attendance in the 14-year history of the event! Motorcyclists from thirty-four (34) states traveled to Washington, D.C. and advocated for issues that matter to street riders. In just one day, all 435 members of the House of Representatives and 100 Senators received an informational packet from the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) explaining who we are, what we have done and what we want.

Definition of a Motorcycle – We continue to educate lawmakers about our concerns regarding the out-of-date federal definition of a motorcycle. In 2024, we will pursue a legislative fix that more appropriately fits vehicles on the road today.

Ethanol – The MRF continues to seek allies from diverse groups to push back against increasing ethanol mandates. This year the MRF met with groups, like the oil producers, in hopes of joining forces to preserve access to E10 and fuel grades with lower levels of ethanol.

Internal Combustion Engine – Two separate bills, H.R. 1435 and H.R. 4468 passed the U.S. House this year. Both bills would limit the power of state and federal officials to restrict the purchase of vehicles with internal combustion engines. Each bill has a companion in the U.S. Senate. S. 2090 would limit states from setting their own regulations, while S. 3094 would stop the federal government from mandating the manufacture of electric vehicles. We will continue to press Senators to join these bills as cosponsors and seek final passage.

Motorcyclist Advisory Council (MAC) – Created by federal law in 2021, the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) has been slow in establishing the MAC. In May, at the urging of the MRF, thirteen (13) lawmakers sent a letter pressing DOT to seat the MAC. This month, the DOT finally began the selection process for the MAC. The MRF has worked hard to advocate for qualified candidates for the MAC and we anticipate a formal announcement on membership soon.

Profiling – While 2022 saw the passage of our second Congressional resolution on profiling, we continue to look for opportunities to work on this issue. For the second year in a row, the funding bill for DOT seeks a report back from NHTSA on motorcyclist profiling.

Right to Repair – We are committed to preserving consumer choice and affordable access to parts, and thus have worked to support H.R. 906, the Repair Act. We continue to drive cosponsors to the bill and our work during Bikers Inside the Beltway helped double the number of cosponsors on the bill to almost fifty (50). We anticipate that the House Committee on Energy and Commerce will consider the bill during the first half of 2024.

Roadshow – From California to Florida, New Hampshire to Oklahoma and states in between, the MRF has been on the road listening to what matters to bikers. We are also happy to deliver presentations informing state motorcyclist rights organizations about issues of interest to motorcyclists at the federal level. MRF board members made it to twenty (20) states in 2023 and we hope to exceed that number in 2024!

Safety – In May, the MRF met with representatives from the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) to continue a dialogue about motorcycle safety. More safety funding and increased awareness and accountability by other vehicles on the road were among the topics we discussed.

2024 is shaping up to be another busy year for the MRF! Our sustained engagement here in Washington, D.C., combined with your visits to Capitol Hill and support back home, is what allows us to maintain total vigilance and achieve victories in Congress.

Thanks for a momentous year. See you in 2024!

Safety Tips from the Leroy Gross

The following is from the American Motorcycle Association and pertains to their support of motorcycle owners "right to repair" their own motorcycle, have parts available and not void the warranty by doing maintenance and repairs.

"As motorcycling technology continues to advance, your ability to repair your own motorcycle or seek out an independent mechanic may get restricted as manufacturers do not make repair information or parts available for purchase.

Consumers are facing this problem with almost every product they own, from their phone, to their tractor and for AMA members, their motorcycles and ATVs. This issue is collectively known as "Right to Repair" and put in the simplest terms, right to repair is the idea that when you buy something, you have the right to repair it or seek an independent repair shop to do the work and manufacturers must make

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the parts and information needed for these repairs available to the public for a fair and reasonable price.

Fortunately, the U.S. House of Representatives has reintroduced the REPAIR Act (Right to Equitable and Professional Auto Industry Repair), H.R. 906, for the 118th Congress. The bill would ensure that motorcyclists and independent repair shops have access to the information, tools, and parts needed to repair motorcycles. On November 2, 2023, the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Innovation, Data, and Commerce held a markup on the REPAIR Act. Republicans and Democrats both agree this legislation is important for consumers to make repair decisions best suited for their situation. Lawmakers in the markup offered bipartisan amendments to protect personally identifiable data associated with your vehicle. "

Biggest Social Security Changes for 2024

COLA boosts benefits by 3.2%, but Medicare premiums are also going up

The <u>cost-of-living adjustment</u> (COLA) gets the headlines, but multiple aspects of Social Security change annually to reflect national trends in prices and wages, affecting the benefits paid to tens of millions of Americans and the taxes paid by nearly all U.S. workers. Here are five important ways Social Security will be different in 2024.

1. COLA benefit boost

Inflation cooled considerably in 2023, but consumer prices still went up, producing a <u>3.2 percent COLA</u> for Social Security beneficiaries. That will raise the estimated average retirement benefit by \$59 a month, from \$1,848 to \$1,907, starting in January, according to the Social Security Administration (SSA).

That's a considerably lower bump than the 2023 COLA of 8.7 percent, which, fueled by red-hot inflation in 2022, was the largest adjustment in more than 40 years when it took effect in January 2023. But in historical terms the 2024 bump is still slightly higher than usual: Since the early '90s, the COLA has averaged around 2.5 percent a year.

The <u>maximum benefit</u> for a worker who claims Social Security at <u>full retirement age</u> (FRA) in 2024 will be \$3,822 a month, up from \$3,627 in 2023. FRA is 66 years and 6 months for people born in 1957 and 66 and 8 months for those born in 1958; people born from July 2, 1957, through May 1, 1958, will reach it in 2024.

The COLA isn't just for retirees. It increases monthly payments for all types of Social Security and for <u>Supplemental Security Income</u> (SSI), an SSA-administered benefit for very-low-income people who are age 65 and older or are largely unable to work due to blindness or other disability.

2. Medicare premium offset

If you are enrolled in Medicare, chances are you have premiums for Part B — the part of the federal health care program that covers doctor visits and other outpatient treatment — deducted directly from your Social Security payments. That means an increase in Medicare premiums can undercut your cost-of-living adjustment.

Beneficiaries got a rare respite from that <u>offset effect</u> in 2023, as the big COLA was accompanied by a <u>drop in Medicare premiums</u>. But the offset is back in 2024, with the standard monthly <u>Part B rate rising</u> from \$164.90 to \$174.70, shaving about \$10 a month off the COLA gain.

3. Social Security taxes

Social Security benefits are <u>primarily funded</u> by a 12.4 percent tax on most workers' incomes. If you have a job, you pay half of that rate (via <u>FICA withholding</u> from your paycheck) and your employer covers the rest. If you're self-employed, you pay both shares as part of your annual tax return.

The rate has been the same since 1990, but the amount of income subject to it changes annually in line with national wage trends. In 2023, you paid Social Security taxes on work income up to \$160,200. In 2024, the threshold goes up to \$168,600. Earnings above that level are not taxed for the purpose of funding Social Security, nor is any income from investments.

4. Social Security earnings test

If you collect Social Security and continue to work, a portion of your monthly payment may be temporarily withheld. This <u>earnings test</u> applies to people who collect retirement, <u>survivor</u> or <u>family benefits</u>; have not yet reached full retirement age; and have earnings above a certain level.

The threshold changes annually, tracking national wage trends. In 2024, beneficiaries who will not reach FRA until a later year have \$1 withheld from their Social Security payment for every \$2 in work income above \$22,320 (up from \$21,240 in 2023).

For example, if you have a \$40,000 job, your benefits for the year would be reduced by \$8,840 — half the difference between \$22,320 and \$40,000.

If you will reach FRA in 2024, Social Security withholds \$1 in benefits for every \$3 in earnings above \$59,520 (up from \$56,520 in 2023) until the month when you hit the milestone. At that point, the earnings test expires — there's no longer any work-related deduction, and the SSA adjusts your benefit upward so that, over time, you recoup the prior withholding.

People receiving <u>Social Security Disability Insurance</u> (SSDI) face different income rules. Because SSDI is intended for people who are largely unable to work for an extended period due to a <u>serious medical condition</u>, you can lose it if your earnings reflect what the SSA calls <u>"substantial gainful activity."</u>

The 2024 threshold for most SSDI beneficiaries is \$1,550 a month, up from \$1,470 this year. People receiving SSDI on the basis of blindness are subject to a higher income limit: \$2,590 a month in the coming year, up from \$2,460 in 2023.

5. Qualifying for benefits

You become <u>eligible for retirement benefits</u> by collecting <u>Social Security credits</u>, which you get by doing "covered" work — a job or self-employment in which you pay Social Security taxes on your income. In 2024, you get one credit for earnings of \$1,730, \$90 more than the 2023 level.

You can earn up to four credits a year, equivalent to \$6,920 in work income in 2024. It takes 40 credits, or 10 years of covered work, to qualify for retirement benefits (the 10 years do not need to be consecutive).

You must also compile credits to <u>qualify for SSDI</u>, but the number required can range from six (for a year and a half of work) to 40, depending on how old you are when a medical condition sidelines you from work.










THE CUT-UP CROSS PUZZLE
